



HOLIDAY FESTIVAL OF LIGHTS & MUSIC

It seemed to us that during these difficult times, every one of us could stand a gigantic infusion of joy and beauty and laughter in our lives...a moment of pure magic that lifts our hearts and brings us something wonderful to see and hear and feel. So, we thought, what better way, than to spend an evening amid dazzling holiday lights at riverside with jazz and caroling, with marvelous Christmas trees and model trains, with adorable animals, and good country food, or even looking in other people's houses made wondrous for the holidays and richer, for the legends spun therein. We get a thrill just thinking of it.

So, **The Holiday Festival of Lights and Music** was born.

A year ago we started planning... thinking big and bigger, and even bigger still. Now, **thousands of lights** are going up in the ancient live oaks. Several thousand more will adorn **25 Christmas trees** decorated in various ways from a primitive theme with rusty tin, candles and homespun to elaborate trees shimmering with butterflies, acorns, fruits, flowers, elves, and a host of other unusual ornaments, all and crafted from crystals, satins, beads, gold, silver, and velvets.

Area school children will have special trees to decorate.

During daylight there will be the fun of **wagon hay rides** starting at 3:30 and at



5:30, **Santa** will arrive in surprising "Southern style" to light the tallest tree and to give children gifts for the wild birds' holiday. Santa will also introduce our **2010 Spirit of Christmas**, a child chosen for his/her continuing contribution to the happiness and welfare of others.

Free concerts begin at 6:45 in the pool house and will continue until closing at 9:30. Famous jazz bassist, **Ben Tucker**, is the featured artist with his trio and vocalist performing jazz arrangements of holiday songs from his Christmas album. Ben will play two sets, one at 7:00 and the last at 8:15. There will also be **community caroling**, other special holiday music, and all concerts are included in the price of admission.

If you have never tried **square dancing**, this is the moment. This is one form of merriment in which anyone at almost any age can participate and there is no shame attached to not knowing how. That's what engaging professional caller, **James Hurt** is there to do...to put you at complete ease to enjoy this just-plain-fun time set to good, country music. In fact, we have had to extend square dancing time to one hour for each session, the first starting at 4:30, because people have so much fun they won't stop.

Christmas seems more like Christmas with electric trains nearby. At the Festival,

Cruise, Meredith's nutty bay horse, the one that used his huge teeth to key the hood of the vet's brand new truck, has moved over to Spy's pasture to entertain our guests, and he seems to be savoring the attention.

Now he has been joined by miniature equines, **Sassy** and **Clementine**. If you ever enjoyed Thelwell pony cartoons, Sassy is one... champagne-colored with tiny fine legs, a delicate head, an enormous belly (she has been a mom on several occasions) and a mop of mane and forelock any Thelwell aficionado would approve. She is also just as sassy. Her baby, three month old mini mule, Clementine, (aka Saucy, in her professional life), was sired by a Sicilian donkey and has the stallion's wonderful markings including the dark cross on her back and withers. 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three model railroad layouts will fill the first floor of one of Dunham Farms' buildings. These include an elaborate "N" scale countryside, an HO gauge "Thomas the Tank Engine", a long-time favorite with kids, and a traditional G-gauge model railroad that will make its way around the Christmas tree. These beautifully detailed displays have been engineered and installed by, and are on generous loan from members of the Middle Georgia Model Railroad Club who will man the exhibit during Festival hours.

Dunham Farms is a major historic site and three of its buildings will be open to the public. **Palmyra Cottage**, decorated circa 1840, will be open from 6-9:30. **Palmyra Barn**, a 1930 farm structure, adapted as a country inn, will be open 4- 9. There will be guides in both buildings.

An advance reservation for a timed ticket tour is advised for the third house which is limited to 90 visitors per night. This tour explores the main house built on the foundations of the original 1755 home. The land was granted by England's King George II and it is Georgia's oldest coastal plantation still owned intact by the original land grant family. Private tours of the house are small, 15 people, (ages 10 and up) in each group led by local historians who tell the fascinating stories behind the home's history and its artifacts. The tour's highlight is a beautiful **twenty minute lute concert** by noted musician, **Christopher Kohut**, a lovely event that will take place in the glow of Christmas trees, candles and firelight.

Among its many historic preservation projects, Dunham Farms grows endangered **seminole peas™**. At the Food Service area you'll have a chance to sample them made into dark, nutty Seabrook Hoppin' John. The Service Area is also where **country dinners** and **snacks** will be served, while next door in the **Gift and Garden Shops**, special area handcrafts will be offered with artists in residence to discuss them.

The Festival of Lights and Music is a **benefit for award-winning Seabrook Village**, the first African-American living history museum in the South. Funds will go to assist the non-profit Foundation's many educational programs and the upkeep of its buildings, an impressive collection of vernacular architecture included on the National Register of Historic Places. Stop by their information desk. It's a joy to chat with these dedicated people who manage Seabrook's 90 acre site with only volunteers, small donations, and determined hearts. The Festival is honored to support them.

FESTIVAL GREEN

Dunham Farms (formerly Melon Bluff) has a long, long conservation and environmental record and the Festival will be no different. We are using LED lighting at an 80-90% power savings. Dozens of light strands and up to 1,000 feet of light rope will run off a single household outlet and we've chosen certain types and colors because they draw fewer amps. Our heads ache from all the technology we have had to master in order to make this event "green" and yet visually amazing.

In addition, we are using many handmade decorations and those that will be recycled for years to come. They will be used differently each year so that future Festivals will be fresh and new while always enveloping us with the magic of the season.

PROFILE: BEN TUCKER, JAZZ BASSIST

By any estimate, **Ben Tucker** is a legend and a treasure. He is an impressive human being at every level and he fits the Festival idea of offering glorious holiday music that adds real joy to the season.

As a jazz bassist, he has performed with all the top musicians of the day including Herbie Mann, Buddy Rich, Peggy Lee, Cy Coleman, Quincy Jones, Gerry Mulligan, Ellis Marsalis, Mose Allison, Charlie Byrd, Chris Connor, B.B. King, Gene Krupa, Marian McPartland, Ella Mae Morse, Errol Garner, Benny Goodman, Shirley Horn, Peter Nero, Mel Torme, and on and on. He has written over 300 tunes, including often-recorded, *Comin' Home Baby*. He has performed world-wide and at elite events including the Newport Jazz Festival.

As if that weren't enough, Ben is a successful business owner. He owned and managed a radio station that soared to #1 in the market where it remained for 13 years, earning the attention of the Wall Street Journal. In New York, his TV commercial production company won the prestigious "Clio Award", comparable to the film industry's Oscar. He managed a successful music publishing company and originated Savannah's notable jazz club, Hard Hearted Hannah's.



Ben has been noted often on the national scene. President Carter appointed him to the Advisory Committee for the Arts for the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts. In addition, he served on the Georgia Fair Employment Practices Advisory Board and his testimony before Washington, DC committees resulted in changing the economic strata for black entrepreneurs.

Most of all, this charming man is an incredible musician. You are in for a wonderful evening, or, putting it on a personal basis, whether you want your holiday music to make you feel warmly mellow, or joyfully uplifted, Ben's jazz will take you there.

New Wedding Garden Opens 2011

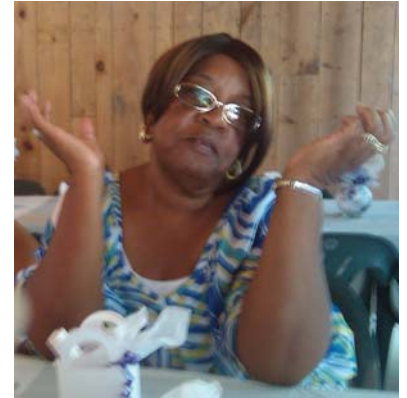
